New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning (NFLL) is a Mesa Community College (MCC) non-credit, community education program designed by and for active seniors in the community. NFLL members serve as MCC ambassadors to active adult learners: providing peer-led classes (in person and online), social events, volunteer opportunities, and physical activities like hiking, biking, and walking groups. The fee to join NFLL is \$80 covering activities in the academic year from August 1, 2025, through July 31, 2026. No partial fee is available. For this fee members may attend unlimited in-person, online classes, or social events as they wish. Additional fees may be assessed for supplies and social events.

New Frontiers membership is a Two-Step process. Register through MCC Enrollment Services or your online Student Portal for the *MCC Non-Credit Seniors* course for \$80. Afterwards, access your New Frontiers account on the NFLL website. The Membership fee must be paid to Mesa Community College before registering for classes.

Current Member Renewal

- 1. Complete <u>2025-26 Membership Form</u>. Wait for an email (within 5-7 days) confirming you are registered with instructions on how to pay your \$80 fee.
- 2. Pay your fee online, in person at the Dobson Campus, or by phone (480-731-8800). Credit card payment is requested.

New Member Enrollment

If NEW to MCC, first complete the non-credit admissions process. Go to <u>Non-Credit Admission</u> to get started. Not comfortable doing this online? You can complete the **non-credit** admission process in person at the Enrollment Center at either MCC site.

- Complete the New Frontiers <u>2025-26 Membership Form</u>. After submitting, wait for an email confirmation (within 5-7 days) stating you are registered in New Frontiers with instructions on how to pay your \$80 fee. You also have the option to self-register and pay in your Maricopa Student Portal. Fall 2025 course Class is #23046.
- Go to <u>newfrontiers.mesacc.edu</u>. Click on the <u>Members Acct</u> tab at the top <u>right</u> of the page. Create a New Frontiers Pro Class account. Keep a record of your User ID and password – you will need this each term to register. Your account will be activated within 2-3 business days after you pay.
- 3. Once you have been notified that your ProClass account has been activated, you may register for classes.

Unique Plants of the Sonoran Desert and Arid Lands

The iconic saguaro reaches for the sky. A prickly pear cactus produces delicious edible fruit. An agave sends up a 12-foot-high flower stalk to create future agaves. Using nature's perfectly engineered spines, Chollas "jump" onto a passing host. Life-long naturalist, Boyce Thompson Arboretum docent, and author Jim Shepherd talks about Sonoran Desert plants, plant relationships/adaptations, survival techniques, keystone versus indicator species, medicinal benefits, and wildlife relationships in a one-hour program called "Unique Plants of the Sonoran Desert and Arid Lands." Shepherd's book, "A Walk In The Wallace Desert Garden: Discovering Desert Secrets," can be purchased after the program, and he will be happy to sign it. The book profiles 48 arid-land plants, featuring full-color photos, ranging from succulents to euphorbias to trees. It's a great guide to the namesake Boyce Thompson Arboretum trail and a handy reference book on the Sonoran Desert and arid land plants.




