New Member Enrollment

- Step One: NFLL members must enroll in MCC as a non-credit student before registering for New Frontiers classes. The enrollment process may take 2-5 days, so it is important to complete this process before class registration opens. To enroll the first time
 - To begin, go to <u>newfrontiers.mesacc.edu</u>. Click on the **Members Acct** tab at the top of the page.
 - Select *New User? Start Here*. Complete the form according to the online instructions and select *Submit*. Enter your name as you would like it to on your name tag.

2. Step Two:

- a. Once the <u>New Member Form</u> is submitted, you will be notified by the MCC New Frontiers office for confirmation and instructions on payment of enrollment fee.
- b. In 2 to 3 business days, you will receive an email with instructions on how to contact the MCC cashier and pay the New Frontiers fee of \$80.
- c. Once you have paid your fee, you can register for classes starting January 1, 2025. Follow the *Online Class Registration* instructions below.



Plate Tectonics controls the landscape of the Earth. The Earth's crust is divided into plates, and these plates are constantly moving. Plates consist of continental crust and oceanic crust. Continental crust is less dense than oceanic crust. In places, continental plates are being split apart, (Red Sea & Africa) and in others they are crashing together (Indian Plate and Eurasia). Pulling apart of plates creates oceans, crashing together of plates creates mountains. In some places new oceanic crust is being created, and in some places, it is being destroyed as it sinks below continental plates.
