REGISTRATION INFORMATION

New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning (NFLL) is a Mesa Community College (MCC) non-credit, community education program designed by and for active seniors in the community. NFLL members serve as MCC ambassadors to active adult learners: providing peer-led classes (in person and online), social events, volunteer opportunities, and physical activities like hiking, biking, and walking groups. Learn more about NFLL at newfrontiers.mesacc.edu or call 480-461-7497.

The fee to join NFLL is \$80 covering activities in the academic year from August 1, 2025, through July 31, 2026. No partial fee is available. For this fee members may attend unlimited in-person, online classes, or social events as they wish. Additional fees may be assessed for supplies and social events.

Current Member Renewal

NFLL members continuing from Fall 2025 only need to go to the Members' Account tab on the NFLL [website](http://newfrontiers.mesacc.edu), after January 12, 2026, and select the classes they want.

New Member Enrollment

New Frontiers membership is a Two-Step process. Register through MCC Enrollment Services or your online Student Portal for the *MCC Non-Credit Seniors* course for \$80. Afterwards, access your New Frontiers account on the NFLL website. The Membership Fee must be paid to Mesa Community College before registering for classes.

1. If NEW to MCC, first complete the MCC Non-Credit Admissions process. Go to [Non-Credit Admission](#) to get started. Not comfortable doing this online? You can complete the **non-credit** admission process in person at either campus' Enrollment Center.
2. Complete the New Frontiers [2025-26 Membership Form](#) online. After submitting, wait for an email confirmation (within 5-7 days) stating you are registered in New Frontiers with instructions on how to pay MCC your \$80 fee. You also have the option to self-register and pay in your Maricopa Student Portal. Spring 2026 course, the Class to enroll in is # 25249.
3. After your fee is paid, go to newfrontiers.mesacc.edu. Click on the **Members Acct** tab at the top right of the page. Create a New Frontiers Pro Class account. Keep a record of your User ID and password – you will need this each term to register. Your account will be activated within 2-3 business days after you pay. The NFLL Office will notify you that your ProClass account has been activated, and then you may register for classes.

CLASS REGISTRATION OPENS JANUARY 12, 2026

To register for NFLL classes:

1. Go to newfrontiers.mesacc.edu.
2. Click on the **Members Acct** tab at the top **right** of the page.
3. Login, **DO NOT** create a new account.
4. **Update** your member account information if necessary OR ask for a password recovery.
5. Click on **Search** at the upper left and find your classes. **Registration opens January 12, 2026**, for the Spring 2026 term.
6. Register for your classes. After selecting your courses, **be sure to submit the registrations**.
7. **If you need assistance with online registration, leave a message on the NFLL office phone, 480-461-7497 and one of our volunteers will get back to you. We are happy to help.**
