#### Greeting from Roland Tanner, President:



As New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning (NFLL) moved into FY 2021-22 COVID issues continued, but as an organization we were now adapting to the new "normal." In all categories we grew by significant numbers as noted in the Fast Facts

In the early moments of CoVid we scrambled to develop training classes for WebEx and Zoom and discovered that there were some wonderful benefits to

having classes on-line. For example, anyone, anywhere, could participate and we were no longer limited to a physical room size. We were only limited to 100 participants on Zoom or WebEx.

We did lose a significant number of members initially, but we increased membership this year. Marketing and advertising in the years ahead will be key to bring our numbers back up. We slowly opened our "Out to Lunch" in the Fall 2021 to Spring 2022 and our last outing at Broken Yolk Cafe had 37 attendees which may have set a record! So, there certainly is demand for face-to-face interaction.

**Spring Membership Meeting** We were finally able to have our Spring Membership Meeting in person for the first time in three years on May 19<sup>th</sup> at Red Mountain Community College. Dan Taylor greeted the group and commented on how it was wonderful to see everyone in person.

Councilmember David Luna gave greetings. David has always been a strong supporter and told our group he will be joining NFLL soon. We heard an insightful presentation by the outgoing MCC President, Lori Berquam. She shared a truly meaningful quote with us: "I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did. BUT PEOPLE WILL NEVER FORGET HOW YOU MADE THEM FEEL."



Lori Berquam is staying in the area and has plans to join NFLL. She also treated us with ice cream. In the business meeting portion, we elected Cindy Schrantz as NFLL President. All the other officers and at large members were re-elected for another year. Mary Boehlen graciously took on the Membership Chairperson responsibility.

# Your NFLL Council in Action:

- ✓ The Council has always been very generous in its limited budget to provide student scholarships funds of at least \$3,000 per year and often more. The Council made a unanimous decision to increase that to three \$2000 scholarships for this year, and the Scholarship committee is in the process of selecting those students. We were able to do this due to our current reserve.
- ✓ The Council took action on raising the membership dues back to \$80 per year for all returning and new members. The development of virtual classes allows for our local and winter visitor friends to take classes from anywhere in the world.
- ✓ Overall, the Council members are truly dedicated to continuing to increase membership, class opportunities and volunteer support. Please note that these dedicated persons give countless hours to our organization. This year alone the Council members, committees, facilitators, and instructors gave 5,364 hours for a value of \$150,192. WOW!
- ✓ Our website has a new contemporary look thanks to our webmaster, Allan Zisner.
- ✓ The Council wants to recognize MCC staff support over the last year. # Scholarship Committee: Barbara Thelander, Chair

- The NFLL Scholarship Committee members: Mary Boehlen and Shirley Epp met with Adela Bob, MCC Financial Aid Office, on June 14 to finalize the NFLL Scholarship plan for 2022-23.
- Three \$2,000 scholarships will be awarded to three MCC students, \$1000 in the Fall 2022 and \$1,000 in the Spring 2023. Applications will appear online in Academic Works, and opened June 13 with awards anticipated on August 20.
- Scholarship Criteria: minimum of 12 credit hours completed; 3.0 cumulative GPA; financial need; enrolled in a minimum of six credit hours at MCC.

# Support Services: Peggy Randolph and Kathee Rutherford, Co-Chairs

Support services include a wide array of key components for NFLL:

- Website: Support Services' most visible component is our website, with Allan Zisner as Webmaster. Allan introduced an updated version of the website in May 2022.
- Newsletter: The newsletter is produced by Marie-France Ganansia five times a year.
- Database: The database is important to both Curriculum and Membership. This is where members create and maintain their New Frontiers accounts, and where they login to register for classes, Peggy Randolph continues as the database administrator.
- Mailing Team: The mailing team assembles packets to be mailed to members in spring and fall. Packets include the schedule of classes, the newsletter, and an Open House flyer.
- Nametags: Suzanne Brown graciously volunteered to continue assembling and mailing members' nametags after she took on the role of Curriculum Chair.
- Publicity Team: Distribute flyers, submit articles, etc.

## Curriculum Committee: Suzanne Brown and Cindy Schrantz, Co-Chairs

- We tried something new for Summer 2021. We did not require registration for any classes. Every Friday an email was sent with information listing all classes and links. We received such positive feedback, that the process will continue in Summer 2022.
- Successfully transitioned to having a mix of on-line, in person, and simulcast classes in Fall 2021. Attendance for on-line or in person is roughly the same, showing how our members have enjoyed having options on how to attend classes.
- Began holding curriculum-based field trips.
- Attendance increased over 30% from the previous year (2020-2021).
- Organized hosts and facilitators with clear directions on their role in providing classes online.
