1. Age of Wonder -- Tuesdays, Jan 14 – April 1, 14 weeks, 10:30 - noon

Join the Mesa Arts Centers' Creative Aging team to improve movement through dance. Students will use dance as a modality for telling their life story. NFLL enrollment limited to 10.

2. Zuill Bailey Concert Experience -- Wednesday, Jan 29, 2025, 10 am - 12 noon

Renowned cellist, Zuill Bailey will guide us through classical music and the concert etiquette. Join the Mesa Arts Center Creative Aging team in learning more about "Classical Music Inside Out." NFLL enrollment limited to 15.

3. You're Family to Me: Intergenerational Storytelling Workshop – Weekly in March

Join a cohort of storytellers for a series of workshops that explores the notion of family and everything they mean to us. The series You're Family to Me invites you to come as an individual, pair, or trio of people who belong to your family - which could mean people you're related to, your chosen family, work family, or any other kind of close familial connection you share.

The series will guide participants through some storytelling circles, sometimes fully open to any story and sometimes following themes like home, food, ritual, and coming-of-age moments. Participants will tell and listen to many stories; help support each other in developing and honing the craft of storytelling; and build a bond of community. The series will culminate in a free, casual performance of these stories with an invited audience.

No storytelling experience needed. Bring yourself as you are. Enrollment limited to 10 pairs.

4. Smart Phone Photography -- Tuesday, Jan 22, 1 session, 10 am - noon

This smartphone/tablet photography class will cover an introduction needed for creating photographs, from recommended settings, composition tips, lighting, and editing. The class is for individuals 55+ years. Enrollment limited to 15.

Tour of Falcon Field Airport Jennifer Wong

New Frontiers' members attended a tour of Falcon Field Airport organized by Greg Master and facilitated by Monica Karel of the Social Committee.

Members met in the lobby of the terminal building where they were greeted by a member of the Marketing Department who gave us an introduction of Falcon Field Airport which is owned by the City of Mesa.

We got into shuttle vans for a short drive to a hangar which houses about 8 fighter planes dating back to World War II. Falcon Field Airport was used to train



British pilots how to fly Stearman fighter planes before they returned to their home base to await their next assignment. The original hangar, which dates back to World War II, is easily recognizable from its semi-circular roof.

At the hangar, members were greeted by one of Falcon Field's docents who told us pilots were required to have a total of 250 flight hours in order to fly planes during World War II. He also introduced us to the two planes which airmen trained in before returning to their home base in the UK.

All of the pilots were British. However, the flight instructors and support crew were all American. During an informal chat, we discovered the father of one of our members, Robert O'Connell, used to work as a flight instructor at Falcon Field during World War II.

Most of the planes in the hangar are flown on a regular basis to keep them in working condition. Some are used to take veteran pilots for a ride. Others are used for fly-by's to honor fallen pilots.

On our return trip back the terminal building, we had a drive-by tour around Falcon Field Airport and drove by Banner Medic's planes as well as the control tower. Sadly for us, we were unable to have a tour of the control tower.

If anyone is looking for a place in Mesa from which to watch Arizona's spectacular sunset, the terminal building is available. While there, you can also see the planes departing and arriving at the airport. If you live near to Falcon Field Airport, you might be fortunate to see a WWII-era plane flying overhead while you're outside in your backyard.
