## New Frontiers 2025 Holiday Luncheon

On Thursday, December 4th, the Social Committee hosted its annual Holiday Luncheon for New Frontiers members. The luncheon was held at EVIT (East Valley Institute of Technology) in its Culinary Arts building and the food was prepared and served by EVIT's chefs-in-training.

The event kicked off with a flyer emailed from the Social Committee, inviting New Frontiers members to register for the event by clicking on a link in the flyer which directed them to the Purple Pass website where they could register, choose their entrée, and pay for the Holiday Luncheon with a credit card.

Using Purple Pass for the luncheon was new this year and most New Frontiers members found the system easy to use. However, if you were unable to register online for the luncheon, you could contact MCC Liaison, Debby Smith, for assistance.

Selections on the menu were either short ribs with root vegetables, crispy shallots and merlot demi-glace; seared salmon filet with cucumber and dill relish; or seasonal vegetable hash sautéed with olive oil over roasted potatoes. The entrees were perfectly prepared and artfully plated. Dessert consisted of three delectable mini tarts.



Continuing New Frontiers' annual tradition, attendees donated non-perishable foodstuff and personal hygiene items, all of which were donated to Mesa Market, MCC's campus food pantry.

Including MCC staff and entertainers, a total of 71 people attended the luncheon. Three additional members had paid but were unable to attend.

Kathleen Perales, Associate Dean of Student Affairs at MCC, who is currently New Frontiers' administrator and advocate, attended. Kathleen will be retiring in January of 2026 and shared her farewell with us at the luncheon.

This year, the tables were decorated with a festive garland and seven small candles surrounding a glittery, star-topped, Styrofoam Christmas tree. At the end of the luncheon, each person left with a grab-bag of assorted high-quality candies and a candle.

Entertainment was provided compliments of Suzanne Brown by The Salt River 5, a subset of the Salt River Brass Band, who returned this year to entertain us with holiday music while we dined.
