SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning is pleased to announce that three \$2000 scholarships will be offered to MCC students for the 2022-2023 Academic year.

In the 25 plus years that New Frontiers has been a program of MCC, members have offered student scholarships and celebrated recipient's success. This past two years have been difficult for students with the advent of online learning due to the pandemic. But, three \$1000 scholarships were awarded for the school year's in 2020-2021 and in 2021-2022.

Scholarship Applications will open in early June 2022 and close in August 2022. The NF's Scholarship Committee works closely with MCC's Financial Aid Office. NF's will be involved in assessing applicant's criteria based on Financial Need, Academic Goals, and Employment, Extracurricular Activities, Leadership, Volunteer or Community Service Experience.

Why Don't We Record Online Sessions?

The Curriculum Committee has received many requests to record online sessions and certain speakers but is unable to do this frequently. Why?

The recorded sessions on Zoom or WebEx produce very large files. To store these files for playback, the host must save the recording to either their own computer or their own cloud storage areas such as One Drive or Google Drive. The memory space for the free storage areas is very limited and often will hold only one 90-minute program. Additional storage space is sold only with annual memberships costing approximately \$500 per year.

Several programs this year have been recorded and made available for a limited time. Our audit of the access of these files shows, while many request the link, few, if any members watch the replay.

Future recording of sessions is at the discretion of the online host and the permission of the presenter. If a host records a program and makes the line available, please thank them. Our volunteers are the best!

Summer Session 2022 is Coming!

The Summer 2022 Session is starting June 6, 2022 and will run 9 weeks until August 6, 2022. No classes will be held on Monday, July 4th. The Curriculum Committee has course offerings to please most members. There will be social activities, cycling, history, and just plain fun things to pass the time during our hot summer days. Again this year, we will be sending out a weekly email with the coming week's courses and activities and links to online courses. Members may join online courses as they wish. Facilitators And Online Hosts Needed for Fall!

Facilitators and Online Hosts are needed for the Fall Session. Training will be provided.

Facilitators are the contact with the presenter prior to a session and then serve as the class moderator by introducing the speaker, monitoring questions, and generally handling the details of the course.

Online hosts set up the Zoom or WebEx link, open the class 15 minutes before the session and handle technology issues for the online course. Zoom hosts must have a personal account, WebEx hosts use the MCC Webex system which is free to NFLL members.

And the Birth of New Frontiers


Peggy Randolph, chair of the Support Services/Communications committee, suggested that I meet with Richard Shifler, one of the founding members of New Frontiers for Learning in Retirement. Yes, in 1994, there was no such a thing as *New Frontiers for Lifelong Learning!*

One morning, Greg Master and I had breakfast with Dick and his son John. What a pleasure to listen to Dick sharing his experience as one of the founding members of our organization. We are very grateful to him for describing what the organization was at its beginning. We are even more grateful for loaning us his precious memories to read, two binders full of information about the organization and about the *Southwest Historical Adventures Group*, the "Desert Rats" which he facilitated from 1994 to 2002.

New Frontiers for Learning in Retirement, NFFLIR, was created in the Fall of 1994 by 23 retirees who were attending classes at Mesa Community College.

The founding Memorandum of Understanding with MCC stated that NFFLIR was a membership learning organization sponsored by MCC and affiliated with The Elderhostel Institute Network (Road Scholar) and ALIROW, the Association of Learning in Retirement Organizations of the West.

The first Open House was held in September 1995 and the organization grew from a core of 29 dedicated people to 71 charter members. In October, the Fall semester began with the first study groups and the first edition of the newsletter, the *New Frontiers News*.



New Frontiers for Learning in Retirement

The first annual meeting for the membership of NFFLIR was held in November 1995. Three committees were created, Curriculum, Membership/Promotion, and Administration/Finance.

Six years later, in 2000, membership had grown to 350.

Dan Taylor, MCC administrator, Barbara Thelander, MCC head of Community Ed and Nancy Olson, the Community Ed staff person who had the idea of starting the organization, were very helpful during the startup phase of the organization.

Dick Shifler, a native of Maryland and a retired mechanical engineer, was first the vice-chair of the Administration/ Finance committee. He soon became the facilitator of the *Southwest Historical Adventures Group*, the "Desert Rats".

Dick had always been an avid traveler. During his professional life, he had traveled to many countries, China (in 1970 before President Nixon) and South Africa to name a few.

When retired, his thirst for travel didn't stop and he started to organize tours, first in Arizona, then in neighboring states (one week in Santa Fe and Taos, NM).

From 1995 to 2002 he organized 150 trips ranging from half a day to a weeklong. It was the only activity that was going on all year around.

When browsing the mine of information his binder on "Rat Tales":-) provides, I can't help but think how little I know about Arizona and its History. Most of the trips included a visit to a historical place like the Champlin Fighter Museum, in Falcon Field, nowadays in Seattle, the Besh Ba Gowah in Globe, the Deer Valley Rock Art Center.....

Most of the trips contained a solid historical narrative coupled with the pleasure of eating. For example, even a day trip to Usery Park, would start with a copious breakfast under a ramada, followed by a hike to the wind cave.

"In the beginning...presumptuously borrowing a tried and true intro...the Southwest Historical Adventures class requested a volunteer to keep notes for a class history. Like the proverbial rice pot...they have boiled over. Meeting notes blossomed into trip tales. Correct them, change them, add to them but mostly enjoy them. They are fallible. They are just memories."

The scribe, Dorothy Zebrowski, wrote most of the notes in grand style and with a lot of humor.

For example, this one describing the Colorado River rafting trip at Grand Canyon and titled *Thirty "near drowned rats"*.

"The first rapid the raft hit head on and full speed, caused a wall of water the size of Rhode Island to engulf the raft and anyone in, on or near. 48 degree water is either a real wake up or knock out. No hearts stopped soooo we did it again! Near drowned horrified rats in various positions clinging to ropes for dear life are not a pretty sight!...We all survived when our facilitator Dick Shifler, realized just as we were ready to board the buses, that we were missing 3 people. Good facilitator! Dependable facilitator!...(a raft had motor trouble).....Would we do it again? In a minute!"

The trips were not sanctioned by MCC. A liability release was developed and signed by participants protecting carpool drivers from liability.

"No catastrophe ever happened" said Dick, "although a lady broke her wrist, and another one fell on her face....."


What strikes one when reading the memories are the joy and enthusiasm that transpire these *Rat Tales*.

The Rats were so happy with their facilitator that they presented him with a PROCLAMATION on February 25, 1997.

We look back with envy at the activities our predecessors enjoyed.

Thanks to founders like Dick, NFLL has a rich heritage of exploration, education and adventure that we can all hope to continue and expand.
